Dear parents, carers and children,

At last we seem to have some proper Spring weather with a hint of summer's warmth in the mix too. It has made for some great days out to launch topics. I had the pleasure of teaching Godrevy last week was able to give them a geology lesson at the beach and a little bit of history about the lighthouse and the disaster of the SS Nile that highlighted the necessity for something to protect the ships from 'The Stones'. After that we were added in a little biology with a wander up to look down on Mutton Cave where the seals didn't disappoint and as we had been learning about Grey Seals in guided reading it was great to see them in the flesh with some very enthusiastic Meadow Pipits providing the background music. As a result of the morning the children were able to create excellent information texts about the beach on the laptops which have been refurbished as Chromebooks – a great week of work. Yesterday they returned to the beach, this time under the guidance of Miss McLennon, and to develop their ability to describe settings linked to their upcoming narrative work.

Last Monday Kynance was using the beach in a similar way with children creating animal sculptures out of sand and imagining what would happen if they came to life. The children did not know at the time but the idea was taken from a real published story called The Sandhorse which they have now been introduced to and that will form the stimulus for a 'storytelling'. Whilst at the beach the children were also introduced to the Geography aspect of their topic; looking at coastal features and how they are formed and let's be honest: there are few better places in the country to be able to do this.

Rinsey head to the beach today to look at the habitats there and compare contrast to what they already know about the Galapagos Islands from their topic launch. Last week Mrs Haddy as is often the case used some artistic activities to help children appreciate the beauty of biodiversity in the islands and elsewhere as part of her topic, 'Life on Earth'. Tomorrow will also need some creativity from the children as they have to create habitats for creatures of Mrs Haddy's creation to better understand the concepts associated with adaptation.

Poldhu will be focusing on life under the sea next half term so will definitely have some trips to the beach lined up then but this half term they are going 'Into the Woods'. To launch their topic, they first went to Tanglewood last week. There they found an enchanted wood full of fairy houses and other magical delights. On return to school it seems that some of the fairies may have followed them or we have our own resident population as they have started to receive letters from them. This has inspired some quality writing of their own as they write responses to their mysterious friends and this afternoon they will further develop their mapwork skills as they draw plans of where the fairies can best build houses in the school grounds. (It may well be that I may be able to help bring their designs to reality with a woodworking club next half term.

On the note of clubs, we are sorry for any confusion caused by the reshuffle over Easter which was only apparent when you actually opted to book on parent pay. It also meant, with Mr Buckley leaving that the offer for KS2 was much depleted. With this in mind we have had another reshuffle and have put running club back on the timetable on Monday and moved the KS2 sports club to Thursday. A timetable of clubs will be sent out today but please continue to book on parent pay. Running club will have a new format with every other week being Running XL where I will take children off site in the minibus a little before the end of the day so that children get to experience a variety of terrain to run on and explore some of the best trails in our local area. Many thanks to Ellie Jameson for helping to make running club possible this half term and to her and all the other parents for supporting and helping out at Coose Trannack this weekend – as always it was a brilliant event and the runners did us proud with great sportsmanship and this year two medals and several children scoring points for the school by getting in the top six. For once the event was also blessed with sunny weather and there looks more set to grace us this week to although the weekend ahead is not looking so favourable so make the most of it.
